# ABOUT THE CENTER FOR LEGISLATIVE ACCOUNTABILITY

The Center for Legislative Accountability (CLA), an initiative of the American Conservative Union Foundation (ACUF), is the premier organization for holding lawmakers accountable. The CLA produces the longest-running conservative congressional scorecard and our state program is the only one in the nation that scores all 8,000 lawmakers in the 50 states across every policy area. In addition to ACUF's Conservative Political Action Conference (CPAC), the largest gathering of conservatives in the world, the CLA develops conservative policy solutions and educates everyday citizens and activists on the proper role of government. In 1971, ACUF launched its *Ratings of Congress* to provide a comprehensive evaluation of the voting records of every Member of Congress.

The Ratings quickly became considered the "gold standard" and over the following decades have been utilized by activists, voters, academics and elected officials to determine which lawmakers best adhere to conservative principles. In 2011, these Ratings were expanded into state legislatures as part of a five-state pilot program. By 2015, *Ratings of the States* grew to include all 50 states and all 99 legislative chambers.

Today, the CLA annually analyzes over 105,000 pieces of legislation to issue scores for all of America's federal and state lawmakers and presents awards to lawmakers who score 80% or better in recognition of their conservative voting records.

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## **METHODOLOGY**

The CLA's Ratings of Congress and the States illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. When determining a position on a particular issue, the CLA begins by defining conservatism: the political philosophy that sovereignty resides in the person. Then, we apply the founders' belief that the proper role of government is to protect Life, Liberty and Property.

In order to depict how closely a lawmaker adheres to conservative principles, the CLA selects from the full spectrum of issues relating to the economy, culture, national security and government integrity. Some key areas include taxation, spending, education, labor, licensure, regulation, environment, life, free speech, Second Amendment rights, foreign aid, defense priorities and global organizations, including the United Nations. All congressional and state analyses are conducted after the adjournment of a legislative session to ensure that no issue is neglected.

Each lawmaker is evaluated on a zero to 100 scale, with a score of 100 representing a voting record that is perfectly aligned with conservative principles. Officials who earn a score of 90% or higher are presented with the CLA's highest honor, the Award for Conservative Excellence, while those who earn a score of 80% or higher, but less than 90%, are presented with the Award for Conservative Achievement. Additionally, any lawmaker who earns a score of 10% or lower qualifies for the ACUF's Coalition of the Radical Left.

## **ANNUAL METRICS**







To determine legislative rankings, the CLA annually evaluates over 105,000 bills that were introduced in Congress and every convening state legislature running from January 1 to December 31. Of those bills, the CLA ultimately selects roughly 2,000 pieces of legislation that best illustrate how elected officials view the role of government in an individual's life. The CLA calculates individual scores for a total of nearly 8,000 federal and state lawmakers based on over 157,000 votes cast on the 2,000 bills selected. The CLA provides a score for each legislative chamber, which is based upon the average scores of all members within that respective chamber. A legislature's overall score is calculated by averaging each state's two legislative chambers together in order to better reflect the differences in political power between the chambers. (The exception being Nebraska, the nation's only unicameral legislature comprising a single legislative chamber, on which the state's overall score is based.)


DEMOCRAT AVERAGE 7%


# **VERMONT SENATE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS**


- 1. PR 5 Enshrining Abortion Up to the Moment of Birth into the State Constitution. (Proposal 5) ACU believes abortion is a human tragedy, supports restrictions on the practice and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 9, 2021 by a vote of 26-4. (The House voted to approve the bill in 2022, the proposed amendment will appear on the November ballot.)
- 2. SR 6 Weakening Property Rights by Overturning Gov. Scott's Executive Order Which Streamlines Permitting Under the State's Land Use Law. ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect the right of property owners to develop and utilize their property. ACU supports Governor Phill Scott's effort to modernize Act 250 to streamline the permitting process and provide greater regulatory certainty and opposed this resolution. The Senate voted to disapprove executive order 02-21 on February 4, 2021 by a vote of 22-8.
- 3. S 10 Further Harming Small Businesses Weathering the Pandemic by Hiking and Expanding Unemployment Benefit Payouts. ACU recognizes that coupled with federal unemployment benefits, a number of individuals on unemployment may actually earn more than they would on the job. ACU opposes this measure which ultimately increases employer hiring costs and discourages individuals from reentering the workforce and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 30, 2021 by a vote of 18-12. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 4. S 15 Weakening Election Integrity by Implementing a Permanent Vote-by-Mail Scheme. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards, such as reserving absentee voting for individuals who would otherwise be incapable of voting, are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 27-3 and the bill was signed into law.
- 5. S 30 (Vote No. 1) Weakening Security and Second Amendment Rights by Making Hospitals "Gun Free" Zones. This vote approves sections #1 and #3 of the gun control bill. ACU recognizes that "gun-free" zones merely disarm law-abiding citizens while doing nothing to prevent criminal activity and the illegal possession of firearms. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 20-9. (The bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.)
- 6. S 30 (Vote No. 2) Weakening Security and Second Amendment Rights by Approving a Study to Make the Capitol Complex a "Gun Free" Zone. This vote approves sections #2 of the gun control bill. ACU recognizes that "gun-free" zones merely disarm law-abiding citizens while doing nothing to prevent criminal activity and the illegal possession of firearms. ACU supports the founders' belief in the Second Amendment and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 18, 2021 by a vote of 19-10. (The bill failed to advance in the House in 2021.)
- 7. S 51 Restricting Free Speech and Intimidating Donors by Forcing PACs to Name Connected Organizations in Filings. ACU recognizes this measure directly contradicts the Supreme Court's ruling in Citizens United v. FEC which recognized business (and union) contributions as free political speech. ACU opposes this measure which is designed to restrict free speech and intimidate donors engaging within our nation's political and democratic process and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 24, 2011 by a vote of 22-8. (The bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 8. S 79 Driving Up Housing Costs Through a "Housing Registry" and other Draconian Mandates on both Long and Short-term Rental Properties. ACU opposes this government overreach which unnecessarily drives up housing costs by imposing significant new compliance costs on traditional landlords as well as individuals who occasionally rent out their homes through platforms such as Airbnb and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 20-10 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 9. H 81 Increasing Property Taxes by Removing the Uniform Cost-Sharing Arrangement for Public School Employee Health Benefits. ACU opposes this measure to further empower greedy union bosses during the collective bargaining process which will ultimately make housing even less affordable due to property tax hikes and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on March 26, 2021 by a vote of 22-5 and the underlying bill became law without the governor's signature.





- 10. S 100 Unnecessarily Driving Up Taxpayer Costs by Advancing "Free" School Breakfast for All Students. ACU recognizes that students from low-income families are already eligible for no cost meals under existing government programs. ACU opposes unnecessarily burdening taxpayers by socializing the costs of meals for students who can afford them, and mis-utilizing scarce taxpayer resources on pointless studies and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on April 30, 2021 by a vote of 29-1. (This version of the bill failed to advance in the House.)
- 11. H 106 Growing Government Dependency by Turning Public Schools into Social Welfare Centers. ACU recognizes this measure which establishes new welfare initiatives is funded with \$3.4 million in one-time funding under the federal American Rescue Plan Act. ACU opposes further trapping individuals into government dependency, especially when such initiatives are funded through an unsustainable funding source and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 14, 2021 by a vote of 22-6 and the bill was signed into law.
- 12. H 157 Hiking Home Improvement Costs Through a Draconian New Licensing and Regulatory Regime on Anyone who Provides Residential Services Above \$3,500. ACU recognizes the materials and labor required to complete most home improvement projects can quickly exceed \$3,500. ACU opposes this excessive government intrusion into the private sector which restricts competition and raises consumer costs and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 21-9 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 13. H 171 (Committee Amd.) Further Socializing Childcare Costs Through \$12.7 Million in New and Expanded State Programs. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes measures that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty and opposed this bill. The Senate adopted the amendment on April 30, 2021 by a vote of 30-0 and the underlying bill was signed into law.
- 14. H 177 Weakening Election Integrity by Allowing Non-Citizens to Vote in Montpelier Elections. ACU believes granting non-citizens voting privileges devalues U.S. citizenship and the efforts of those who obtained citizenship through the legal process, opposes weakening election integrity and opposed this bill. The Senate voted to override the governor's veto on June 24, 2021 by a vote of 20-10 and the bill later became law.
- 15. H 360 Socializing Broadband Expansion Through a New Fund and Grant Program. ACU believes the market is the best mechanism to determine the need for broadband, does not believe that taxpayers residing in one area should be forced to subsidize the amenities of those who choose to live in another area and opposed this bill. The Senate passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 30-0 and the bill was signed into law.








## **VERMONT HOUSE CONSERVATIVE RATINGS**

# **VERMONT HOUSE VOTE DESCRIPTIONS**

- 1. JRH 6 Advancing Radical Leftist Policies by Declaring Racism a "Public Health Crisis". ACU believes in equal rights under the law for all, that it is the duty of government to ensure all laws are applied equally, and that those who discriminate will face repercussions in the marketplace. ACU opposes the Left's quest to stoke division and grow the size and scope of government and opposed this bill. The House passed the resolution on May 12, 2021 by a vote of 135-8.
- 2. S 15 (Strong Amd.) Protecting Election Integrity by Delaying Implementation of the Vote-by-Mail Scheme Until 2023. The Strong (ACUF Lifetime 85%) amendment to the bill authorizing voting by mail. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards, such as reserving absentee voting for individuals who would otherwise be incapable of voting, are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and supported this amendment. The House failed to adopt the amendment on May 12, 2021 by a vote of 39-99.
- 3. S 15 Weakening Election Integrity by Implementing a Permanent Vote-by-Mail Scheme. ACU recognizes that election integrity safeguards, such as reserving absentee voting for individuals who would otherwise be incapable of voting, are designed to help ensure that one person cannot cast the ballot of another (or one person on behalf of many others). ACU opposes weakening election integrity by eliminating safeguards that prevent voter fraud, which disenfranchises eligible voters, and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 11, 2021 by a vote of 119-30 and the bill was signed into law.
- 4. S 79 Driving Up Housing Costs Through a "Housing Registry" and other Draconian Mandates on Both Long and Short-term Rental Properties. ACU opposes this government overreach which unnecessarily drives up housing costs by imposing significant new compliance costs on traditional landlords as well as individuals who occasionally rent out their homes through platforms such as Airbnb and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on May 21, 2021 by a vote of 93-54 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.
- 5. H 81 (Sibilia Motion) Increasing Government Transparency by Referring the School Employee Health Benefit Bill to the Education Committee for Fiscal Review. The Sibilia (ACUF Lifetime 36%) motion to commit the public school employee health benefits bill to the Committee on Education. ACU supports this effort to strengthen government transparency by ensuring the significant fiscal impact of this bill is calculated and impact on taxpayers publicized and supported this motion. The House defeated the motion on February 16, 2021 by a vote of 50-96.
- 6. H 81 Increasing Property Taxes by Removing the Uniform Cost-Sharing Arrangement for Public School Employee Health Benefits. ACU opposes this measure to further empower greedy union bosses during the collective bargaining process which will ultimately make housing even less affordable due to property tax hikes and opposed this bill. The House voted to advance the bill on February 16, 2021 by a vote of 102-46 and the bill became law without the governor's signature.
- 7. H 133 Seizing Firearms without Due Process Through a "Red Flag" Confiscation Measure. ACU recognizes this measure allows the seizure of firearms without due process by allowing one individual to submit an ex-parte (i.e., one-sided) petition to a court against another individual. ACU opposes this and other so-called "red flag" measures, supports the founders' belief in both in the Second Amendment and due process under the law and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 12, 2021 by a vote of 102-44. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
- 8. H 157 Hiking Home Improvement Costs Through a Draconian New Licensing and Regulatory Regime on Anyone who Provides Residential Services Above \$3,500. ACU recognizes the materials and labor required to complete most home improvement projects can quickly exceed \$3,500. ACU opposes this excessive government intrusion into the private sector which restricts competition and raises consumer costs and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on April 6, 2021 by a vote of 97-52 but the bill was vetoed by the governor.



- 9. H 171 Further Socializing Childcare Costs Through \$12.7 Million in New and Expanded State Programs. ACU supports efforts to help people live happier, healthier, more productive lives, opposes measures that expand dependence on government, which leads to intergenerational poverty and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 24, 2021 by a vote of 146-1. (This version of the bill failed to advance.)
- 10. H 175 (Marcotte Amd.) Protecting Retailers from Being Forced to Collect Used Beverage Containers Under the State's Recycling Program. The Marcotte (ACUF Lifetime 69%) amendment to the beverage container redemption deposit bill. ACU opposes the state's recycling scheme which is environmentally unproductive and unnecessarily drives up consumer costs, supports protecting retailers from the high compliance costs and supported this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on April 15, 2021 by a vote of 64-79.
- 11. H 175 Hiking Consumer Costs by Expanding the Types of Products Subject to the Beverage Container Redemption Deposit. ACU opposes unnecessarily driving up consumer costs in order to further expand the state's costly and inefficient beverage recycling program. The House passed the bill on April 15, 2021 by a vote of 99-46. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate in 2021.)
- 12. H 177 Weakening Election Integrity by Allowing Non-Citizens to Vote in Montpelier Elections. ACU believes granting non-citizens voting privileges devalues U.S. citizenship and the efforts of those who obtained citizenship through the legal process, opposes weakening election integrity and opposed this bill. The House voted to override the governor's veto on June 23, 2021 by a vote of 103-47 and the bill later became law.
- 13. H 360 Socializing Broadband Expansion Through a New Fund and Grant Program. ACU believes the market is the best mechanism to determine the need for broadband, does not believe that taxpayers residing in one area should be forced to subsidize the amenities of those who choose to live in another area and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 23, 2021 by a vote of 145-1 and the bill was signed into law.
- 14. H 361 Allowing Children Aged 16 to Vote in Local Elections in Brattleboro. ACU opposes this ploy by Democrats to prey on children who are not yet mature enough to comprehend the outcomes of their policies and opposed this bill. The House voted to override the governor's veto of the bill on April 29, 2022 by a vote of 102-45. (The Senate failed to override the governor's veto.)
- 15. H 436 (Cina Amd.) Expanding Wealth Redistribution by Imposing a 3% Income Tax Surcharge on Earnings Above \$500,000. The Cina (ACUF Lifetime 0%) amendment to the omnibus tax bill. ACU recognizes this measure would result in a marginal income tax rate of 11.75%, the second highest in the nation behind California. ACU supports fostering economic growth by establishing a tax code with the lowest possible rates for everyone, believes the state should significantly slash its unnecessary and wasteful spending to balance its budget rather than shaking down the wealthy and opposed this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on March 26, 2021 by a vote of 21-125.
- 16. H 437 (Scheuermann Amd.) Protecting Property Owners by Removing the Additional 0.5% Property Transfer Tax on Transactions Above \$1 Million. The Scheuermann (ACUF Lifetime 64%) amendment to the omnibus tax bill. ACUF's Center for 21st Century Property Rights is a leading voice on this issue and works to protect property owners from excessive taxation. ACU supports a tax code with the lowest possible rates for everyone, opposes the additional tax which disincentives business investment and supported this amendment. The House defeated the amendment on March 25, 2021 by a vote of 53-94.
- 17. H 437 Socializing New Manufactured Housing Costs by Imposing an Additional 0.5% Property Transfer Tax on Transactions Above \$1 Million. ACU opposes this cronyism which enriches developers and purchasers of certain manufactured housing while socializing the cost onto other property owners and disincentivizing business investment and opposed this bill. The House passed the bill on March 25, 2021 by a vote of 95-51. (The bill failed to advance in the Senate.)
